# Why it's a Subaru of course!



#### More specifically, a 1970 Sambar 360

Fuji Heavy Industries, which launched the Subaru brand, began in 1953 selling motor scooters. By 1958 the company had launched its first automobile called the 360. By the late 60's, Subarus started to be exported to the United States. At the time, Consumer Reports called it "the most unsafe car on the market."

The 360 Sambar Van and pickup were the smallest highway legal passenger trucks. This was in 1961. The 61 to 66 Sambars were rear-engine vehicles and had a "cab-over" design like other trucks at that time, including the Chevrolet Greenbriar, Ford Econoline, and the Volkswagon Van.

The second generation Sambar debuted in January of 1966 and ran until 1973. Top speed of the 1970 Sambar was around 59 MPH and weighed in at 1,180 pounds. The base price was \$1,366.

The Sambar is still being built today by Daihatsu/Toyota and is a larger version than the original.



#### What's a Euclid?

The Euclid Company of Ohio was a company that specialized in heavy equipment for earthmoving, namely dump trucks, loaders and wheel tractor-scrapers. It operated in the US from the 1920s to the 1950s, when it was purchased by General Motors. It was later purchased by Hitachi Construction Machinery.



Your new tires... would you like a black wall, white wall, red wall, blue wall, orange wall, yellow wall, green wall.....???



Date line, 1933, B.F. Goodrich announces "New beauty for this year's smart car, BF Goodrich custom-built Silvertowns in colors!"

These new tires casings were treated in a number of color combinations that Goodrich guaranteed would retain their brilliance throughout the life of the tire. They called the process of applying the colored sidewalls "Color-Weld." The sidewalls were ingrained with pigmented rubber and don't appear to be completely smooth like regular black and whitewall tires are.

These tires were special order only. However, it is unknown whether this promotion was a gimmick, a ruse, or the real thing. Black and white photographs from the day only indicate blackwalls or whitewalls.

By the way, the name "Silvertown" came from an industrial area a few miles east of central London where a tire called the Palmer Cord was developed. B.F. Goodrich purchased rights and introduced its version in the United States as the Silvertown Cord.
