Once again, General Motors has made history.

The 2025 Chevy Corvette ZR1 recently became the fastest car ever built by a U.S. auto manufacturer—and the driver was none other than GM President Mark Reuss.



The GM team traveled to Germany's High-Speed Oval Track at ATP Automotive Testing facility in Papenburg and reached a two-way average speed of 233 mph—they clock you going both ways and take the average to account for wind. Papenburg provides ideal conditions for a high-speed test, like temperature and air density.

The ZR1 is now the fastest current production car priced under \$1 million and the fastest factory-stock Corvette on earth, according to the company. The 2025 ZR1 is expected to start around \$180,000 and go up to \$205,000, according to Car and Driver.

In 2020, Corvette moved to a mid-engine architecture, and the ZR1 has the most powerful V8 engine ever produced by a domestic manufacturer.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

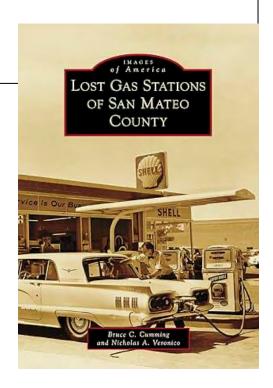

The Archer's 10 millionth Model T Ford cross country venture By Ed Archer

This story is not meant to be a promotion for Henry Ford or Ford Motor Company but the first couple of paragraphs leads you into the purpose of our drive.



Whether you like Fords or not, you gotta hand it to Henry Ford. Among his many attributes, first and foremost, he put America on wheels! Began producing motor vehicles in 1903 with a moderately priced, small 2 cylinder machine called the Model A, (and you thought the first Model A was produced in 1928). The Model A was nothing really special among the many new entries in the fledgling horseless carriage market but he was able to sell enough of them therefore financially enabling him to begin the trek of fulfilling his long-term vision of

producing a low priced automobile of good quality, durable and dependable, that everyone

could afford. In those days motor vehicles were only affordable to the more affluent person. His first offering the Model A, was followed in 1904 by a Model C an improved 2 cylinder version, and he also introduced the model B, a little more upscale car with his first 4 cylinder engine, followed by the F, K, N. R and S. Then by late 1908, the one you've all heard of, the Model T. It was introduced at a low price of \$865.00 (Comparable cars, Reo, Overland, EMF, etc. were in the \$11-\$1400.00 price range). With the introduction of the new Model T, Henry Ford had perfected what he considered the prefect simple chassis design, encompassing most of the aforementioned attributes in his original vision. The final ingredient that made this car so special was vanadium steel. A very expensive steel, light weight yet extremely strong, used on a variety of European automobiles. No foundries here in the U.S. were able to produce vanadium



steel. It's a long story, but Henry Ford found a way to produce it here in the U. S. at an affordable low cost, thus his pursuit of building a light weight yet durable, dependable, inexpensive automobile was accomplished. With his increased refining of the mass production assembly line process, as they say, "The rest is history".

As the years passed and Ford's Model T popularity continued to grow, by 1913 Ford Motor Co. was producing an amazing 1,000 cars per day! With his perfected mass production Henry Ford was able to

keep reducing the price of his Model T until by 1924 you could buy a new Model T Ford for only \$265.00. Fords nearest competitor was Chevrolet at \$495.00! Another amazing fact; by 1924 **50% of all the automobiles in the world were Model T Fords.** So, in 1924 Henry Ford announced the proud completion of the 10 millionth Model T Ford produced, and in order to celebrate that milestone Henry Ford singled out the 10 millionth Model T off the assembly line, a touring car, had it hand lettered "Ten Millionth, New York to San Francisco via the Lincoln Highway" on the side of the body, in large white letters, and appointed his number one "official" driver, Frank Kulic to drive the car on a promotional tour from New York City cross country via the Lincoln Highway to San Francisco's Lincoln Park where the Lincoln Highway ended. (As if the Model T Ford needed promotion/publicity!).

Fast forward to 2024 and the thought of celebrating the centennial of that historical promotional trip, enter, Mike Vaughn of Lincoln Nebraska, past National President of the Model T Ford Club of America, and MTFCA member Mike Bender, volunteered to share the driving, then coerced Clay Smith, owner of Speedway Motors and the Speedway Museum in Lincoln Nebraska, to let them use the museums restored 1924 Model T Ford touring, identical to the one that made the trip in 1924. They decked it out with appropriate lettering and began planning the route. They all agreed that the route had to include as much of the original Lincoln Highway as possible.

As soon as I heard about the plans I contacted Mike Vaughn and established a plan to meet them as they entered California and accompany them into San Francisco. I thought that it would be fun to participate in some way, adding to this historic celebration. So on June 24, Karen and I departed home at the crack of dawn in old number 4, our 1915 Ford race car, and headed east to meet the Mike's and the 10 millionth Model T as it continued west through State Line, Lake Tahoe. It was a cool brisk morning, but as soon as the sun appeared from behind the eastern horizon it began to warm up a bit......and then a short time later we were in the Sierra Nevada's and cooled back down by the shade of the tall pine trees. Fortunately, we were kept reasonably warm by our big raccoon coats. Traffic was light and we made good time with the expectation of meeting them in South Lake Tahoe around 10:15 AM. They were early, and around 4 miles west of Tahoe as we crested a small hill and proceeded around a curve, they went flying by. (You're version of "flying" may be different than our Model T version.) We diced around traffic and made a quick U turn and fortunately they found a wide spot in the road and pulled over to wait for us. After a cordial greeting, with a few travel updates, we headed west, for



lunch in Placerville, and enroute were treated to some very interesting roads that I've never been on, which were obscure parts of the old Lincoln Highway. We were considered guests and were treated to a great late lunch at a nice Italian restaurant (I don't remember the name) in Auburn. By the time we left the restaurant and now knowing some of the Lincoln Highway left to travel, I could see that we were not going to reach San Francisco that day and I could only spare the day, so around 5:30 PM as we entered south east Sacramento we departed ways and Karen and I headed for home as they headed to their evening lodgings. With no headlights on old number 4 it's sun up to sundown driving and we arrived home with a little sun left over......very little! The two Mikes and the 10 millionth made final destination

Lincoln Park in San Francisco the next day to the delight of a nice welcoming crowd. A welcome sight for them after such an arduous historic adventure.
